

2. Private collection of Frederick I of Prussia, Berlin, Berlin City Palace – first listed in 1707 inventory, probably inherited on death of William III in 1702

3. Descent through Prussian Royal Family within the Berlin City Palace

4. Private collection of William II of Prussia – painting moved in 1891 to the Bildergalerie in Potsdam

5. Gemaldegalerie, Berlin – transferred to the Kaiser Friedrich Museum by William II (Germany, date unknown)

6. Stored in an air raid shelter of the Pergamonmuseum from 1939 (Germany, 1939)

7. September 1941-1942, located in the flak towers of the Leitturm Berlin-Friedrichshain (Germany, 1941-42)

8. 11 March – 7 April 1945, transferred to the salt mines of Kaiseroda-Merkers, stored until discovered and confiscated by Americans (Germany, 1945)

9. 17 April 1945, transferred to the Reichsbank, Frankfurt (Germany, 1945)

10. 20-31 August 1945, transferred to the Landesmuseum, Wiesbaden (Germany 1945)

11. 20 April 1949, American trusteeship handed over to the Hessen State (Hessen, 1949)

12. 11 January 1956, return to Gemaldegalerie (Current owner, Germany, 1956).

3. Private collection of Paul Randon de Boisset, Paris, (1709 - 1776)

4. Private collection of Charles-Claude Flahaut de la Billarderie, Comte d'Angiviller, Paris (1730 - 1810) – bought at 1777 auction (Paris, 1777), acquired by A. Paillet who probably functioned as a middleman on behalf of the Comte

5. Musée du Louvre – exhibited at the opening of the museum in 1793 (Paris, 1793 current owner)

1. Private collection of Henry Hoare II, Stourhead (1705-1785), Partner in his granfather's bank (Sir Richard Hoare (1648-1718) - by 1752 (Toynbee 1928, p. 42)

2. Private collection Sir Richard Colt Hoare, Stourhead (1758-1838), grandson of Henry Hoare II

3. Private collection Henry Ainslie Hoare, Stourhead (1824-1894), Richard Colt's Half-Brother's (Henry Hugh) grandson
